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

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1. VALUES



1.1. Accountability

- Meaning: Being answerable for one's actions and choices.
- - » Vertical Accountability: Principal-agent relationship (e.g., elections).
 - Horizontal Accountability: Network of institutions ensuring mutual control.
 - Social Accountability: Civil society organizations and media checking public sector officials.
- Effectiveness: Prevents arbitrary power, avoids conflict of interest, promotes justice and equality and public

Examples:

- Morarji Desai: Regular press conferences, promoting transparency.
- Lal Bahadur Shastri: Took accountability for major railway accident.



🕍 | 1.2. Leadership

- Meaning: Successfully marshaling collaborators to achieve ends, stemming from social influence rather than authority or power.
- Importance: Critical for good governance, ensuring participation, transparency, and accountability.

Examples:

- Dr. Verghese Kurien: Father of India's White Revolution, established Amul cooperative.
- E. Sreedharan: Known as "Metro Man of India," effective project management and engineering leadership.

1.3. Selflessness

- Meaning: More consideration to others' needs than oneself.
- Importance in Governance: Acting solely in the public interest, placing public needs ahead of personal needs.
- Associated Traits: Empathy, Compassion, Kindness, Respect.

Examples:

- ♦ Shaheen Mistri: Left her top-notch foreign education to teach low-income children.
- ♦ Tukaram Omble: Showed courage during 26/11 Mumbai attacks, sacrificing his life.




1.4. Empathy

- Meaning: Ability to sense and imagine others' emotions.
- Types:
 - » Affective Empathy: Sensations and feelings in response to others' emotions.
 - » Cognitive Empathy: Identifying and understanding others' emotions.
- Empathy and Sympathy: Empathy is deeper and stronger while sympathy is instinctive.
- Empathy and Compassion: While empathy is understanding others' emotions, compassion is acting on that emotion.

Examples:

- Ratan Tata: Offered new trucks to surviving Sikh drivers after 1984 riots against Sikh community.
- Ayushman Bharat Scheme: Empathetic policymaking, providing health coverage to over 12 crore families.









🖑 | 1.5. Justice

- Meaning: Fairness or equal treatment.
- Most Fundamental Principle: Equals should be treated equally and unequals unequally.

Examples:

- Sagarmal Gopa: Stood for justice against Jaisalmer's ruler's atrocities.
- P Narhari: Made Gwalior District barrier-free, aiding persons with disabilities.



📆 | 1.6. Probity

- Meaning: Quality of having strong moral principles such as integrity, honesty, decency.
- Effectiveness: Essential for efficient and effective governance, socio-economic development, objectivity, and reducing bureaucratic hurdles.
- Probity and Integrity: Integrity is a broader concept while probity is specific to uprightness and incorruptibility.

Examples:

- Jacinda Ardern: Resigned as New Zealand PM, prioritizing the country's needs.
- Shanmugam Manjunath: Fought against petrol adulteration, exemplifying courage and probity.



1.7. Honesty

- Meaning: Speaking and acting truthfully.
- Importance: Foundation for trust, key in social relationships.

Classical Ethical Frameworks:

- Aristotelian virtue ethics: Honesty as a virtue, balancing between too little and too much honesty.
- Consequentialism: Honesty depends on situations and outcomes.
- Deontology: Immanuel Kant emphasizes honesty as an absolute moral obligation.

Examples:

- Anil Swarup: Implemented transparent e-auction system for coal block allocations.
- Sachin Tendulkar: Walked off the field voluntarily during the 2011 ICC World Cup, exemplifying sportsmanship.




1.8. Dedication to Public Service

- Meaning: Willingness to give time and energy, putting public interests first.
- Dedication and Commitment: Commitment is formally obligated whereas dedication is guided by sense of duty.

Examples:

- Dr. A P J Abdul Kalam: Contributions to missile and nuclear programmes.
- Dr. M S Swaminathan: Green Revolution and National Food Guarantee Act recommendations.









1.9. Integrity

- Meaning: Adhering to one's values and principles even when it is unprofitable.
- Traits:
 - » Honesty / Truthfulness
 - » Fairness
 - » Decency / Respectfulness
 - » Adherence to moral principles
 - » Courage
 - Responsibility / Trustworthiness
- Integrity and Honesty: While honesty means holding the facts as they are, integrity means doing what is right at all times.

Examples:

- Shaheed Hemu Kalani: Resisted torture by the British, not revealing associates.
- K.K. Pathak: Worked to provide good mid day meals, reduce absenteeism and ensuring teacher accountability in Bihar's government schools.



🚔 | 1.10. Objectivity

- Meaning: Acting impartially, fairly, and on merit without bias.
- Importance in Civil Services: Upholds rule of law, reason, merit, and accepted standards.
- Objectivity and Impartiality: Objectivity focuses on evidences in observations whereas impartiality ensures that decisions are taken without bias.

Examples:

- OPOSHAN Abhiyan: Evidence-based decision-making using POSHAN Tracker.
- Digital portals (PROBITY, SPARROW, SOLVE): Assessing performance of Central Government officers.



1.11. Impartiality

- Meaning: Not supporting a group over others, remaining apolitical in civil service.
- Effectiveness: Ensures public trust, good governance and justice.
- Impartiality and Non-Partisanship: While impartiality refer to not taking any sides, non-partisanship specifically conveys political neutrality.

Examples:

- T. N. Seshan: Reforms as Chief Election Commissioner ensuring non-partisan elections.
- Nandan Nilekani: Focused on technological and administrative aspects of Aadhaar, maintaining nonpartisanship.




1.12. Tolerance

- Meaning: Fair and permissive attitude towards differing opinions, practices, etc.
- Importance: Fosters harmony and social cohesion in a pluralistic society, aids in inclusive policy formulation.

Examples:

- Nelson Mandela: Leadership characterized by tolerance and reconciliation post-apartheid.
- Supreme Court of India: Recognition of 'Third-Gender' and decriminalization of consensual same-sex relationships.









🗐 | 1.13. Conscience

- Meaning: Special ability of mind to judge how moral his/her own actions are.
- Conscience describes two things what a person believes is right and how a person decides what is right.

Examples:

Fali Nariman: Listened to conscience during 1975 Emergency and refused to defend suspension of constitutional rights.

2. CONCEPTS



2.1. Attitude

- Meaning: Predisposition to respond positively or negatively towards an idea, object, person, or situation.
- Factors:
 - » Classical conditioning: Learning through repeated pairings.
 - **Instrumental conditioning**: Learning from rewards and punishments.
 - Cognitive appraisals: Evaluating information and experiences.
 - » Observational learning: Learning through observing others.
 - » Persuasions: Deliberate attempts to change attitudes.

Functions:

Knowledge, Utilitarian, Ego-defense, Value-expression



2.2. Social Influence

- **Meaning**: Adapting opinions or behaviors through social interactions.
- Models: Compliance, Identification, Internalization.
- ♦ **Types**: Conformity, Self-fulfilling prophecy, Obedience, Persuasion.



2.3. Persuasion

- Meaning: Effort to change another person's beliefs, attitude or behaviour.
- Principles: Reciprocity, Consistency, Social Proof, Authority, Liking, Scarcity and Unity.
- Modes of Persuasion: Ethos (Credibility), Pathos (Emotions), Logos (Logic).
- Factors: Source, Message Content, Audience Characteristics, Reciprocity, Social Proof, Timing and Context.



2.4. Emotional Intelligence (EI)

- Meaning: Identifying, comprehending, and managing emotions of self and others.
- Significance: Leadership effectiveness, Decision-making, Communication, Conflict resolution, Public engagement.
- Five Domains: Self-awareness, Self-regulation, Motivation, Empathy, and Social Skills.
- Social Intelligence: Individual's ability to understand and manage interpersonal relationships.

Kautilya (Chanakya)

Thiruvalluvar




- **Conduct:** Propriety of conduct is the seed of virtue; impropriety will ever cause sorrow.

- ⊕ Evil unchecked grows, evil tolerated poisons the whole system.


Sardar Patel
